From Our Historian



I have recently had the privilege to befriend some new Cogswell members. They are Ronald Wayne Dunson and his wife, Barbara Jeanne Fisher Dunson. Barbara is the Cogswell descendent through John William Henthorne and **Minnie L. Cogswell**, from the Indiana and Illinois area. Barbara is the greatgranddaughter of Minnie L. Cogswell, great-great granddaughter of Sergeant Louis Smith Cogswell, and great-great-great granddaughter of Samuel Cogswell who married Joanna Smith in 1817 in Bennington, Vermont. As adventurous people in a new country, we know the Cogswells spread out into new parts of the United States of America.

Sergeant Louis Smith Cogswell fought in the Civil War. He was a good and dedicated soldier, who during his service, proved himself to be a poet and gracious letter writer. He met and courted, and married Anne Keene Wentworth on March 18, 1852. His love for his sweet Anne was expressed in many letters during his military service. Through the kindness of the Dunsons, they copied to me the letters written by Sergeant Louis Smith Cogswell to his beloved Anne. Below is one the letters:

Bv Ellie Gassert

Camp 18th Illínois Infantry Volunteers Huntersville near Little Rock, Arkansas May 4, 1865 Dearest Anne,

The mail came today but brought no loving letter from your dear hand. I did not look much for one, as it is not our regular mail day. Tomorrow, I shall look for one \mathcal{E}_{1} not be disappointed, I feel, as I generally get one or two a week and they are always looked for, warmly welcome, \mathcal{E}_{1} a source of comfort to me.

There is something sweet and holy in the mellow evening air Stirring hearts of melancholy like the tones of evening prayer Yet there's nothing on life's journey that so sweetly o'er one comes As the words of loving kindness from the loved ones left at home.

So don't forget to write often & as long letters as you can spare time to, from your work and your dear heart and mind fully and freely to me. I would almost give my hopes here and hereafter for one sweet kiss from your loving lips, one warm embrace from those dear arms and one look on that form, dearest of all things on earth to me. But I must wait, as unfortunately I could not be gratified even at that price today. Mr. Goodloe, our Sutter, a Mason, and myself went over to town tonight to attend a Masonic Meeting for the purpose of taking steps for the institution of a lodge here. We had a very good time and got back a few minutes past nine. I never saw a more noble looking set of men than were congregated in the Little Rock clubroom tonight. I think the prospects good for getting a fine lodge started here soon.

Three steamboats came up today bringing troops for the Texas Expedition and at the same time came the report that old Kirby Smith has surrendered his forces to General Pope. If this be true, they may as well send us home and stop our pay as to keep us here. It is also reported that Jeff Davis has been captured by Stoneman's force. We don't credit it, but it may be true. It has been very warm and windy for a day or two now and the dust is terrible, a fine sand almost as fine as flour, mixed with fine loam. It fills the eyes, nose, lungs and hair, clothes and everything we touch, taste or handle is gritty, sand in your bread, meat, potatoes, sugar, bed clothing, etc. Sand on the floor, a quarter inch deep in an hour after sweeping, plenty of sand - a blessing in war and a curse in dry weather.

While the others are out on drill and other duty, I generally have business in the office to keep me out of all such scraps, once in a while. We go out and stroll once or twice a week just to try it on when I can't find something else to do. I write to you and that is a pleasant way to pass off the time, but it is getting late and I must go to bed and to sleep and maybe dream...

In dreams I press thee to my heart and hear thy gentle tones And gaze into thy loving eyes, but wake alone - alone But courage heart and courage hope, time wheels are ever moving And strength they seem to lug to those from loved ones who are roving Time moves and in its blessed train, it brings the day we meet again.

Another Cogswell Baseball Player



Charles Cogswell (right fielder lying left) played for the South Bend (Indiana) Greens, one of the first official minor league baseball teams in the area, in 1903. A total of eight teams, five of which were from Indiana, played in the 1903 season. The championship game that year was played on Sept. 16th between South Bend and Fort Wayne, with the latter taking home the prize.

You may remember the first Cogswell in baseball, Ed Cogswell (right), from the August, 2009, issue, who played for the Boston Red Caps in 1879, the Troy Trojans in 1880 and the Worchester Ruby Legs in 1882, and died July 27th, 1888, age 34.





And, of course, there is Branden Cogswell who started at age 15 with the South Troy Dodgers, then played for the University of Virginia until he

was drafted by the Oakland Athletics, and sent to play for one of their Single-A teams, the Beloit Snappers where he now plays.

He had survived by eating bugs and flowers and burying himself in the sand, and latched onto the trail of wild camels which eventually led him to some fruit to eat, so he did not become too dehydrated.

Martin Bendle, 51, who lives in Westbury went under the razor on September 3rd, at 8 p. m. at Mr. Bendle's local the Bell Inn. Both he and his mother will have their hair completely shaved in a bid to raise about £500 for Macmillan Cancer Support.

To celebrate ASD's bicentennial anniversary, the Connecticut Historical Society has partnered with ASD to create the "Language, Culture, Communities: 200 Years of Impact by the American School for the Deaf" exhibit, which was on view through October 21. The exhibit features more than 100 objects, including original manuscripts, portraits and photographs, and technology used to assist deaf and hard-of-hearing individuals. Key objects include portraits by the famous deaf artist and ASD alumnus John Brewster, as well as video interviews with current students and more recent alumni. The exhibit highlights the life of ASD's founder, Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, a Yale graduate and ordained clergyman, along with **Alice Cogswell**, the school's first student. It also features items from the school's (and America's) first deaf teacher, Laurent Clerc, who came to Connecticut from Paris to help form ASD after being recruited by Gallaudet.

American Foundation for the Blind Applauds Senate Introduction of Cogswell-Macy Act, Calls for Further Action

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13, 2017 /PRNewswire-US Newswire/ -- The Cogswell-Macy Act, federal bipartisan legislation aimed at improving special education for students with sensory disabilities, was introduced in the Senate this week by Senators Ed Markey (D-MA) and Shelley Moore Capito (R-WV) as S.2087. The House of Representatives version of the bill (H.R.1120) was introduced in February by Reps. Matt Cartwright (D-PA) and David McKinley (R-WV). The American Foundation for the Blind (AFB) is now calling on all Americans concerned about public education for students with disabilities to take part in a National Call-In Day Wednesday, November 15, to encourage Congress to keep moving this legislation forward in support of children who are blind or visually impaired, deaf or hard of hearing, or deafblind.

- Ensure specialized instruction specifically for students who are visually impaired, deafblind, or deaf or hard of hearing.
- Increase the availability of services and resources by ensuring all students who are deaf or hard of hearing, blind, visually impaired, or deafblind are accounted for.
- Enhance accountability at the state and federal levels.
- Increase research into best practices for teaching and evaluating students with visual impairments by establishing the Anne Sullivan Macy Center on Visual Disability and Educational Excellence—a collaborative consortium of nonprofits, higher education institutions, and other agencies to provide technical support, research assistance, and professional development.
